



Race Night 2013

Once again we invite all members to take part in our virtual Race Night. For those of you who have not participated in Race Night before, this is what happens: We offer ownership of imaginary horses as an absent owner at £5 per horse, you can name it yourself or we will invent a name for you. These are then made up into races of 10 horses and an Absent Owners Race Card is printed. Samuel Beales, a great-grandson of our founder Sydney Norgate, drew the cover design for the race card. His drawing is shown here. On race day we draw out the winners and a prize is sent to the winner of each race. We also have the raffle tickets at 50p each or £2.50 per book of 5. The First Prize for the raffle is a £100 cheque and in addition there will be 20 of prizes of £10 each. Alternatively you may wish to make an optional donation rather than taking part in the races or raffle. We do need all requests for horses and



ticket stubs by the 31st October to give us a chance to organise everything.

There is a space on the form for you to request extra books of 5 raffle tickets to sell to others. If you fill this in and send it to me I will be happy to send you the requested number of books. Alternatively you can contact Wendy Thompson on 01430871561 to order more raffle tickets. You are under no obligation to sell all of the tickets you request and part books sold are fine. Please remember to order early, as all ticket stubs have to be back to the office by 31st October.

We hope you can participate again this year; a form is enclosed for your reply. I hope you will get some fun out of it and that we can raise a useful sum to continue the work of the charity.

If you are making a donation and are a taxpayer, please consider signing the declaration on the back of the Race Night form. It would increase your donation at no extra cost to you. I am pleased to tell you that we have been able to reclaim over £7000 from the Inland Revenue under the Gift Aid scheme so far.

We MUST stress however, that if, for whatever reason, you are unable to participate or do not feel that you can sell to others, that you are under NO OBLIGATION to do so and need not return the books to us. We fully understand that people's circumstances are different, that they may have moral or religious objections and that some of our members are less mobile than others.

The 2013 LONDON 10K

On the 14th July the London 10K took place. It is an amazing event and is the largest non televised 10K in the UK. The runners pass a number of famous landmarks including the Houses of Parliament, Nelson's Column and Big Ben.

Well, the weather was certainly kinder than last year (when it was drizzling) but temperatures of up to 30C were quite a challenge! Two of our runners had to drop out at the last minute because of health issues but that still left four who were prepared to brave the heat. The route was the same as for last year and, thankfully, the organisation was better which meant that the race packs arrived in good time.

This time the Olympian Sally Gunnell was part of the team for the official start which was much appreciated by the runners. Nearly 25,000 people took part. To give you some idea of what that means, it took almost an hour for all the runners to run past the place we had chosen as our viewing point. It is difficult to spot individuals amongst so many people which is where the Charity logos become all important. Some of the Charities do take this to extremes. Despite the heat we saw people running in full animal suits including a wolf, an elephant, a tiger and a monkey! One man was even dressed as a post box and I have to say I have no idea which charity he was representing.

As we were watching we noticed at least four runners dropping out of the race to use the toilet facilities at a cafe on the run and then joining back in again! Although there was a large notice saying that the loos were for the use of patrons only, the waitress was very sympathetic to the runners concerned.

We were absolutely thrilled that our runners were able to complete the course and so very grateful to them for their efforts. 
Laryngectomy is not a tragedy 2nd Edition

As you may recall two extra chapters have been added to the book which was originally written by Sydney Norgate following his operation in 1979. He used oesophageal speech and this is therefore the main focus of the original book.

Sydney was a very devoted family man and would have been delighted to know that one of his granddaughters Nicola Oswald, a recently qualified doctor, has written the extra material which forms Chapter 11 of the new edition. Her chapter is entitled A guide to other speech methods following laryngectomy. This chapter has been based on the very useful responses which we received from members when we sent out the Speech Methods Questionnaire last year. It also includes sections on Lifestyle and Thoughts for the Future

The other new chapter has been written by Trustee Ros Oswald and it describes the history and current activities of the Cancer Laryngectomee Trust.




Laryngectomee's Travel Guide to the British Isles
