Race Night 2015

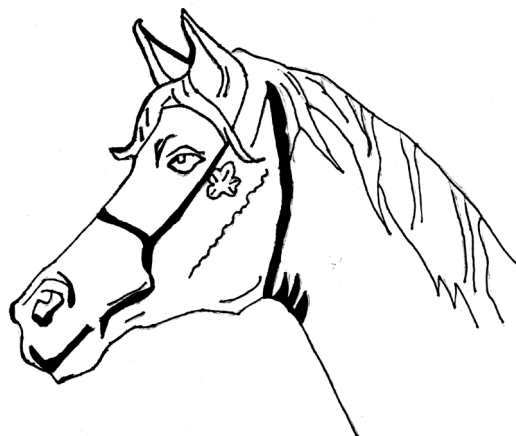
Once again we invite all members to take part in our virtual Race Night. For those of you who have not participated in Race Night before, this is what happens: We offer ownership of imaginary horses as an absent owner at £5 per horse, you can name it yourself or we will invent a name for you. These are then made up into races of ten horses and an Absent Owners Race Card is printed. Samuel Beales, a great-grandson of our founder Sydney Norgate, drew the cover design for the race card. We go to this area in Spain to escape from the UK winter and we belong to the San Luis Bowls Club, the people we have met over the years in this community have been fantastic in helping us when I was diagnosed with cancer of the larynx.

I thought I would never bowl again after my operation as I developed a fistula and had to have my pecks muscle rotated to the neck, to help close the fistula.

That was 2009 and after a long spell hospital I was finally discharged, but realised my right arm movement was drastically reduced.

We carried on going to Spain, my partner carried on bowling and I was just a spectator because of the movement in my arm. But gradually I started to have a little practice on my own and slowly started to play again.

Last year we won the club's mixed pairs competition which qualified us to enter the Champion of Champions competition, we did well but lost in the Semi Final.

The photos I am sending shows us being presented with the mixed pairs cup. I hope this gives encouragement to others.

BAHNON Conference 2015

On the 3rd July the British Association of Head and Neck Oncology Nurses (BAHNON) held a Conference in Birmingham - Sharing Good Practice in Head and Neck Cancer Nursing. They invited CLT to have a stand there and so it was possible for Ros Oswald to represent the charity as a trustee. There was a wide range of talks a number of which were relevant to laryngectomees and it was a good opportunity to spread the word about the charity. There were also friends of the charity there who had some very positive things to say about us.

A pilot service has been operating in Suffolk which is designed to bring cancer care into the community. We heard from Sarah Orr about how the service has been helping cancer patients to have a more local and personalised service. It was interesting to hear about the wide range of work she had been carrying out including providing support to family members and carers as well as to the patient, educating the wider community, holding teaching sessions for community nurses, developing information leaflets and assisting with the preparation of care plans. This work was in addition to the medical care provided which included symptom management, medication advice and carrying out bloods and wound care.

The second speaker, Audrey Scott, who is the chair of BAHNON, talked about the best ways in which to treat skin problems resulting from radiotherapy. It was very obvious how much the nurses care about finding the best possible outcomes for their patients and the level of detail was very interesting.

Next we heard from Karen Matthews and Claire Hanika who are part of the Macmillan Aftercare Service or MARS at the Royal Surrey County Hospital which was launched in 2013. The aim is to improve the patient experience and if possible decrease the need for readmissions which are related to dietary problems, infections or valve problems. Ros spoke to Karen afterwards about the possibility of including some dietary information in the CLT newsletters.

There were talks about Electro chemotherapy, HPV and the importance of detailed research being carried out to make sure the treatment given is always the best possible.

During the breaks, Ros was able to talk to a number of nurses and obtain updating information for the travel guide. It is inevitable that the information in the guide will go out of date as ward numbers and telephone numbers changed but the nurses were keen to stress the importance of the guide. Updating the guide will now be a priority for the Charity.

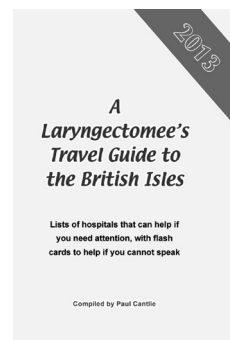
