Extract from Annual Report to Jan 2019

During 2019 we became aware of difficulties some of our members were suffering. This related to people who use the electrolarynx machines. It was apparent that some hospitals were struggling to find funds for the provision of an electrolarynx for patients who needed them. The machines are not cheap, costing upwards of £400. Therefore, there were people who needed a machine but could not afford to buy one themselves. In addition, for some people, the machine needed was a replacement. The electrolarynx is a very robust machine and can last for many years.

It was a major concern for us that people who had had a laryngectomy many years ago might not be able to have a replacement electrolarynx for reasons of cost. The decision about funding equipment such as this is taken by each local commissioning group. Therefore, it is not surprising if there is regional variation. However, it is obvious that to go from having an electrolarynx to not having one will be a very difficult and potentially depressing experience. The National Association of Laryngectomee Clubs wrote to each of its clubs in 2018 to find out how widespread the problem is. Information was received which related to eleven hospital trusts. Out of those eleven, five were experiencing funding difficulties for the provision of an electrolarynx.

Because surgical voice restoration has improved a great deal, the electrolarynx has become less commonly used. However, there are still patients for whom the electrolarynx is the best solution because of the way in which the surgery has to be carried out. From a purely financial point of view, the electrolarynx is less expensive than the costs incurred as a result of surgical voice restoration. The estimated annual cost of prosthesis management for those who have undergone surgical voice restoration is £600 per year. Given that an electrolarynx may well last for more than ten years it is clearly an inexpensive option.

The best solution would be for all commissioning groups to take the view that the provision of an electrolarynx for every layngectomee in need of the machine should be automatic. This is certainly not the current position. As trustees we have made information available about the difficulties to an Ear Nose and Throat trainee doctor who is wanting to undertake research. We shall see how much progress can be made regarding this difficult topic.

In the past we invited members who were fundraising on our behalf or making a donation to the charity to use the online system MyDonate which was provided by BT.


This scheme has now been discontinued therefore we have registered with a new scheme being provided by Virgin Money. To access the scheme a link has been created on our website cancerlt.org/donation

Photothermal Approach to Treat Head and Neck Cancer

Dr Mohammed Al Qaraghuli would like to hear of your experiences in your cancer treatment. He writes:



Head and Neck Cancer affects 600,000 people every year, including over 12,000 patients in the UK. Various factors can trigger this disease, such as smoking, alcohol consumption, and repetitive viral infections. The current treatment approaches rely on surgery, chemotherapy, radiation, or targeted biotherapies. However, these treatments can be either invasive or not very effective.

We have recently established a Glasgow-based biotech company called SiMologics. We design a class of targeted biotherapies, called photothermal therapy, which is composed from biomolecules called antibodies and very small gold particles. This approach can provide a method to burn cancer cells, and treat Head and neck cancer in an effective and non-invasive way.

Albeit being at an early stage, and will require product development time, we are keen to speak to cancer patients to gain their insight into their experience

with the offered treatments. In addition, we are looking to speak to oncologists and surgeons to get their valuable opinion about the currently utilised treatments, and use these discussions to optimise our approach. Dr Mohammed Al Qaraghuli (founder of SiMologics) has worked as a Research Fellow at the School of Medical Sciences at the University of Aberdeen to optimise the development of therapeutic antibodies. He then worked at the University of Strathclyde as a Visiting Researcher in the Strathclyde Institute of Pharmacy & Biomedical Sciences. He then moved to the Department of Chemical and Process Engineering-University of Strathclyde to develop low-cost and efficient diagnostic kits that enable the instantaneous detection of pathogens and contaminants in food chains. In addition to academia, Mohammed has worked in two biotech companies based in Aberdeen (ImmunoSolv and Scotia Biologics) to develop and characterise a set of diagnostic antibodies.

SiMologics has been developed through different entrepreneurial acceleration programmes like the Develop programme of the BioCity- Glasgow, the Rising Stars programme of the University of Strathclyde, and the Royal Bank of Scotland Entrepreneur Acceleration programme). This has enabled us to win various awards like:

- The Best Customer Discovery Prize at the BioCity 12-week Develop programme, November 2017.
- The Most Promising Technology Prize that was awarded by investors during the BioVale-BioBase4SME (North-West Europe) BioCamp, York-UK, June 2018.
